# Orange Preparatory Students Visit Oculus and the 9/11 Memorial Museum

Twenty-nine Orange students were recently treated to a classroom experience at the 9/11 Memorial Museum. These students were selected by Positive Behavior Support in Schools (PBSIS) because they achieved high honor roll status for the 1st marking period or they were top readers in Reading Plus. On this brisk Friday morning, with wind gusts so strong, the water of the North Reflecting Pool had been turned off; even though the water of the South Reflecting Pool was flowing, winds would occasionally mist by-standers admiring the tribute. During the experience, students learned that if they saw a white rose placed in the etched name of the bronze plaques that surround each of the reflecting pools, it was a tribute recognizing the victims' birthday.

The trip included stops at Oculus, the new transportation hub for the World Trade Center Complex and Brookfield's, a premier destination in lower Manhattan. The two hour classroom experience included a guided tour by Mr. Eduardo Quezada, Museum Education Specialist. During the four-hour museum experience, scholars viewed more than 10,000 artifacts in three exhibit halls. One of the most poignant exhibits was the 2,923 watercolor square mosaic by Spencer Finch which represents victims from the 1993 and 2001 attacks at the towers, the squares are surrounded by Virgil's quote, forged from the metal of the towers: "No Day Shall Erase You From The Memory of Time."

Student participant, Amanda Sherwood provided the following reflection of the trip:

I once thought that I understood the September 11<sup>th</sup> events, and its impact, but that has changed since my recent visit to the memorial. I can truly say that I have a different outlook on life, as well as an appreciation for that day and every day. I kept hearing the story being told throughout our tour, "the sky was beautiful; it was clear and blue." While survivors shared their memories, I realized that even on the calmest days, there is no way of knowing when one life changing event could happen, good or bad. Unfortunately, Tuesday, September 11, 2001, was a life changing day and one that is important to remember because so many sacrificed their lives for others. It was not only a life-changing event for America, but also for the world, as 90 nations were represented at the World Trade Center.

One particular story that captured everyone's attention was that of Welles Crowther. Welles carried a bandanna everywhere with him. It was a gift from his father and he carried it to every football game, every firefighter training and even wore it when he worked out. On that day when the second plane hit the South Tower, although Welles could have escaped, his first instinct was to help. Sadly, Welles did not make it out of the fallen tower. However, a group of survivors told their story and shared that they had been saved by a man with a red bandanna wrapped around his face. It was an honor to hear this heroic story, and wondered if I were placed in that same situation, would I do the same?
