Back to School Nights

Orange Preparatory Academy Open House



There was a high level of family participation at the September 25 Orange Preparatory Academy (OPA) Back to School Night. At the open-house, Principal Aretha Malloy (*pictured left*) welcomed parents and students proclaiming that their attendance at the open house is especially important because this is the time our children "need us the most," and encouraged continual family support. She was pleased to see the turnout and

rewarded parents and students with prizes, including a kindle fire and IPODs for several lucky attendees. Parents also had an opportunity to meet the administrative team: Assistant Principals, Noel Cruz, Carrie Halstead and Samantha Sica-Fossella and faculty members. Parents were encouraged to sign-up for the [Parent Portal](#), giving them access to their student's schedules and grades. Likewise parents were asked to fill out [lunch applications](#), regardless of need. Stations were set up to facilitate these requests and the joining of the PTSO.



All 9th through 11th grade students will participate in the PSAT on Wednesday, October 15.

Additionally, ninth grade families registered and received information regarding the PSAT, which their children will take on October 15, from Supervisor of Testing, Ms. Tia Burnett, and School Counselor, Mr. Darryl R. Smith. Representatives of Rutgers Trio Talent Search program were also stationed in the lobby to hand out information to interested families. Rutgers Trio supports students with academic, career and financial counseling, to encourage them to pursue postsecondary education.

Orange Early Childhood Education II Hosts Back To School Night



Parents met in the Oasis Café at Scholars Academy for an overview of the Early Childhood Education Program in the Orange Public Schools. Carol Daly, Preschool Counselor, teachers **(pictured left)** and other staff greeted families as they entered the multipurpose room. There was a table with information flyers, posters to take and cookies and activities to occupy the attending students.

The program opened with remarks from Principal Karen Machuca (***pictured right***) who oversees the OECC II classes housed at Scholars Academy and introduction of the teaching staff. Early Childhood Education (ECE) Master Teacher, Mrs. Amy Burns, presented information regarding the district's use of the High Scope curriculum. She reported that High Scope is aligned with NJ State Standards and Common Core and is based on an "active learning approach." The school nurse, Mrs. Bernadette Guerriero, reviewed several requirements, including the mandated flu shot for all preschoolers and forms to authorize medication for children during school.



Ms. Rosa Santacruz, ECE Paraprofessional, and Ms. Florita Blake, English as a Second Language Preschool Teacher, translated the meeting discussion into Spanish and Creole, respectively.

Parents visited their children's classrooms and met with teachers to gain an understanding of daily activities.

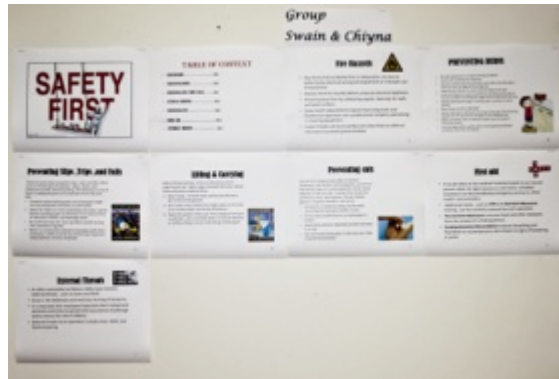

All 9th, 10th and 11th grade students will take the PSAT on Wednesday, October 15. Parents signed a roster to receive study guides for the upcoming test.



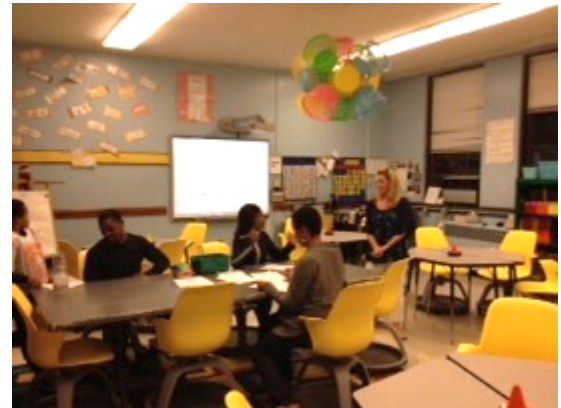

The HSPA is a New Jersey State Department of Education high school graduation requirement. In March 2015, students will be required to retake any sections of the HSPA they did not pass in October 2014.



Honors its Namesake at Statue Dedication

On October 1, Joseph N. DiVincenzo, Jr., Essex County Executive and the Board of Chosen Freeholders dedicated the Statue of Rosa Parks, in the Rosa Parks Plaza outside of the Essex County Veterans Courthouse in Newark, NJ. Teresa Ruiz, New Jersey State Senator/Deputy Chief of Staff cordially invited students from the Rosa Parks Community School to participate in the dedication honoring Mrs. Parks, the civil rights pioneer. Superintendent Mr. Ronald C. Lee, Mayor Dwayne D. Warren, Principal Debra Joseph-Charles and seventeen students from Rosa Parks Community School attended the ceremony. Yanni Halstead, Elliot Holmes and Asianna Kennedy opened the observance with the Pledge of Allegiance. Seventh grade students, Briana Thomas and Daniela Tacuri, participated as speakers. Upon completion of their remarks, they received a standing ovation. In the speech, they noted that Rosa Parks Community School, which marks its ten year anniversary this year, has a population that represents over 30 countries. The presence of so many cultures in Orange was why we should honor Mrs. Parks as a great civil rights leader. Without her efforts, they could not attend a school that is so diverse. Daniela and Brianna also helped to unveil the statue. The inscription on the plaque reads: "Our mistreatment was just not right, and I was tired of it." ~ Rosa Parks ~

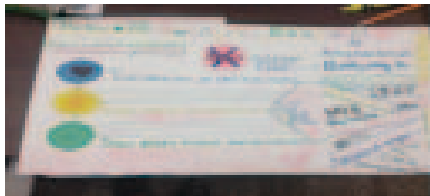
Park Avenue School’s Week of Respect... RESPECT ME!

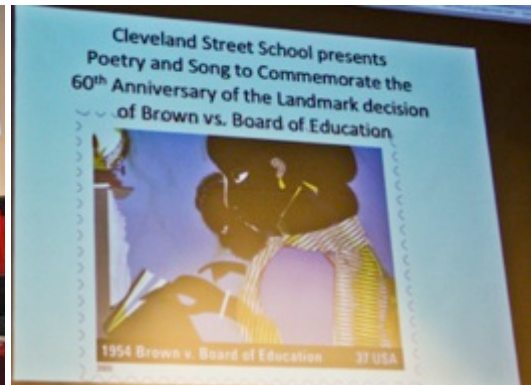

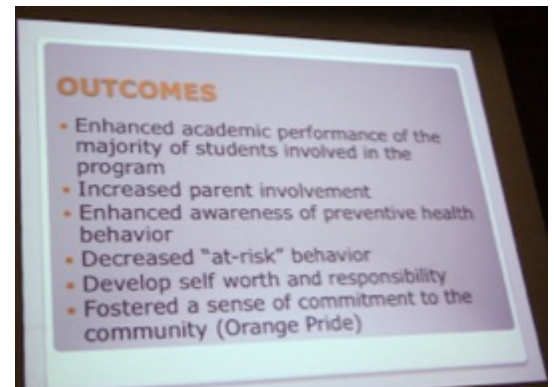

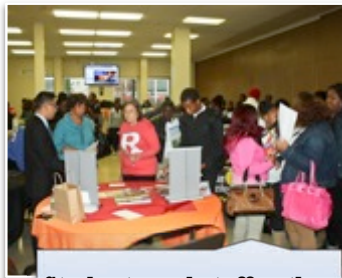

Orange High School Students Attend College Fair 2014

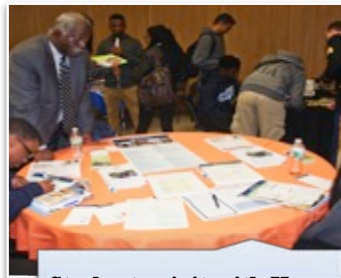
